## NON EMERGENCY, BUT URGENT (NEXT DAY OR TWO)

These signs do not indicate an immediate emergency, but should be brought to the attention of the Foster Team immediately by email, so the foster animal(s) can be examined in a timely manner. Please schedule all of your appointments yourself on our online hub: aurorafosterhub.org

Eyes:  • Yellow or green discharge  • Uneven pupil size  • Red or swollen conjunctiva, including 3rd eyelid  • White film or cloudiness over eye  • Yellowing on white part of eyes	Ears:  • Dark, flaky debris  • pain when rubbed or cleaned  • Frequent scratching at ears  • Unusual smell	Nose: • Yellow or green discharge • Bloody nasal discharge • Excessive sneezing
Skin:  • Lumps  • Hair loss  • Scabs  • Frequent scratching or itching	Temperature:  • Cats or kittens with a rectal temperature higher than 102.5 at rest (outside the normal range).  Note: Animals that are playing or have been lying in the sun have a higher temperature.	Mouth:  Increased appetite  Vomiting more than 3x  Coughing  Trouble eating or chewing  Ulcers or lacerations on gums or lips  Excessive salivation  Loss of appetite: in adults for more than 2 days; in juvenile animals for more than 1 day
Gait: •Sudden lameness that does not improve within a day •Exhibits pain upon walking or handling • Limping	Anal/Genital Area:  • Diarrhea  • No bowel movement for 48 hours  • Straining to defecate  • Small amount of blood in stool (small, scant amount can indicate stress and is not an emergency if not accompanied by lethargy)	Behavior:  • Mildly lethargic  • Poor appetite  • Increased appetite with weight loss  • Excessive drinking  • Increased urination  • Inappropriate urination

If you are uncertain about any aspect of your foster animal's health being an emergency, please CALL! There are no silly questions when it comes to your foster's health!
